



The destruction of Washington in 1814 by the invading British challenged President Monroe and Benjamin Latrobe with the task of rebuilding the edifices which had been destroyed. The preferred building material was marble. Potomac marble, which exists in abundance on both sides of the Potomac River, was used as the building material. In this course, we will also learn about the invasion of 1814 and the methods the British used to burn stone buildings. 



ILR348 History of the Modern Middle East - Part I

5 sessions, 10 hours | **SW**

The first of this two-part course introduces students to the history and culture of the modern Middle East from the dawn of Islam in the 7th century to the eve of World War I in the early 20th century. Participants will come to appreciate the diversity of a region that is often dismissed as monolithic by examining both contrasts in the physical landscape and distribution of resources as well as the intricate mosaic of ethnicities, religions, and languages. Part I will trace the rise of Islam and its impact on the peoples and cultures of the Middle East, including an unprecedented expansion that resulted in a multicultural and intellectually robust empire spanning three continents. We will explore the rise and fall of the Ottoman Empire and Safavid Persia and examine the legacies of successive incursions from the West, beginning with the European Crusades and continuing under the imperial banners of Britain and France. This series will end with an exploration of competing 19th and 20th century nationalism, leading to fallen empires, broken promises, and current hostilities.

Participants will trace the emergence of the United States as a political force in the Middle East, the rise of Arab nationalism, the sequence of Arab-Israeli conflicts/treaties/and accords, the oil crisis of the 70's, and the return to political Islam in its many manifestations. The rapid development and modernization of the Persian Gulf states, sub-regional schisms within the Gulf Cooperation Council, the competition for hegemony between Iran and Saudi Arabia, the return of Russian influence, and the legacy of U.S. intervention in Iraq and Afghanistan are among the topics to be explored in an effort to better understand this fascinating, if volatile, region.



During the Civil War, the famed 54th Massachusetts Regiment, the first all-African American regiment, encamped on these grounds under Colonel Robert Gould Shaw, namesake of D.C.'s Shaw neighborhood. In the early 20th century, the federal government transformed the land into a formal Italian-style garden, complete with sweeping terraces, elegant stonework, and grand fountains. Today, the park is home to the spectacular cascading fountain, one of the longest of its kind in North America, as well as several notable statues, including the only equestrian statue of a woman in D.C. -Joan of Arc. You'll also see memorials honoring figures such as Dante, President James Buchanan, and the graceful Serenity statue. On this trip, we'll stroll the beautifully designed grounds, admire the Renaissance-inspired landscape, and learn about the park's role as both a democratic gathering place and an experimental site for innovative stonework. Relax, explore, and enjoy one of D.C.'s true hidden gems! A boxed sandwich

lunch is included in the fee. Moderate walking on mostly flat surfaces with some steps for up to 1 mile with stops.

LIR317 Cemetery Sojourns - Old Saint **Paul's Cemetery and Westminster Hall Burying Ground, Baltimore**

1 session, 6.5 hours

Join award-winning local documentarian, author, and historian Chris Haugh for another walking tour through some of Baltimore's most historic graveyards. Located near Oriole Park at Camden Yards, Old Saint Paul's Cemetery opened in 1800 under the purview of Saint Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church. This cemetery is fairly small, encompassing only a few acres of ground surrounded by brick walls and open by appointment only. It is noted for the large number of historical figures and prominent families interred in its grounds. Here you will find buried noted politicians, businessmen, war heroes and the son of the founder of Frederick. It once even held the mortal remains of Francis Scott Key before he was moved to Frederick in 1866. We will visit gravesites and then walk a few short blocks to Westminster Hall and its surrounding burying ground. Dating back to 1787, this graveyard of the First Presbyterian Church of Baltimore is the final resting place (hopefully) of writer Edgar Allan Poe, and Philip Barton Key, son of Francis Scott Key, who died tragically in 1859. Chris writes a blog entitled "Stories in Stone" and serves as Preservation Manager and Historian of Frederick's historic Mount Olivet Cemetery. 



Howard Winfield Cox

ILR Instructor

Howard Winfield Cox died peacefully on July 28, 2025, in Frederick, Maryland. A highly regarded federal attorney, investigator, educator and author, Howard was 75. At the start of his career in the federal government, Howard pursued fraud, waste and abuse cases tied to government contracts



and services. As a young staff counsel on the U.S. Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, he helped co-author the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act. Howard served as a criminal investigator, prosecutor and intelligence officer across a broad array of federal offices retiring from the Central Intelligence Agency as the Assistant Inspector General for Investigations. Earlier, at the Department of Justice, he served as Assistant Deputy Chief of the Computer Crime and Intellectual Property Section. His leadership earned him the Attorney General's Distinguished Service Award. Howard was also a U.S. Army Captain veteran. As an adjunct instructor for the ILR Program, he taught history classes. Howard made the most of his retirement, traveling the world with his wife Sharon and using his investigative skills to research and write his well-received book American Traitor (Georgetown University Press). Howard was a warm and witty man.

LIR261 Understanding Spiritual Experiences: Shamanism, Wicca and Occult, Swedenborg, Healing


4 sessions, 6 hours | **SW**

If the class in which you wish to participate is full, additions to the waiting lists can be done online by clicking "Add to Waiting List" when viewing a class.

Important Notes

- Out-of-County students (residing outside of Frederick County) are charged an additional \$5 fee per class. Out-of-State students (residing outside of Maryland) are charged a \$10 fee per class.
- A \$15 one-time-per-year, non-refundable registration fee is due at the time of registration. This fee is only refundable when FCC cancels a class for which the student paid the registration fee and the student has not enrolled in any other classes during this period.
- The Tuition Waiver for Adults age 60+ is exclusive to Maryland residents for select classes.

Class Refund Policy

Class Cancellations Initiated by the College. All students will be refunded 100% of class tuition and fees if a class is cancelled by the College.

Drop/Refund Request within Refund Period

Students who chose to drop a CEWD class will receive a full refund provided that they initiate the drop at least two (2) work days prior to the class start date. Other classes with a different full refund period will be noted in the shopping cart upon check-out. The class refund policy is also provided in the registration confirmation email.

Students have two methods to drop a class:

- Log into https://frederick.edu/QuickEnroll and following the directions under How to Drop a Class on the Payments & Refund page. Self-drops are available up to seven (7) days prior to the class start date.
- Email CEInfo@frederick.edu any time prior to the refund deadline. The drop/refund request must be initiated from the email address associated with the student's account.

Refund Request Outside of Refund Period

Students seeking a drop/refund for a class outside the refund period can initiate the request for extenuating circumstances by completing the Drop/Refund Request Form at frederick.edu/CEWDrefund. Students will be asked to provide documentation supporting the student's request. Appropriate documentation may include electronic or hard-copy documents from medical providers, employers, child care providers, or others that can validate extenuating circumstances. The college reserves the right to approve a full, partial, or deny a refund request submitted outside the full period for the class.

Approved Refunds

Where possible refunds will be generated back to the original form of payment. Cash and money order payments will be refunded by check and mailed to the address on file. Please allow 10-14 business days to receive refunds.

Registration Fee

A \$15 one-time-per-year, non-refundable registration fee is due at the time of registration. This fee is only refundable when FCC cancels a class for which the student paid the registration fee and the student has not enrolled in any other classes during this period.

Age Requirements

Students should be at least 16 years of age to enroll in most continuing education courses, except for those courses specifically designated for younger students. Students under the age of 16 who have completed at least the seventh grade may be permitted to enroll on a case-by-case basis. Students will be considered for such admission if they demonstrate the ability to profit from instruction based on a set of specific criteria. Certain programs or courses of study include higher minimum age for participation when the College has determined that age is a factor necessary to the normal operation of the program or activity. Minimum age is used as a measure of approximation of the level of maturity, judgment, and social independence needed for successful participation in the program or activity in addition to academic skills.
